June Networking Event

The ADAPTability program hosted its quarterly networking event this past June, bringing together organizations from across London, Ontario that are involved in adaptive sport, accessibility, and community engagement. Led by Dr. Laura Misener, the event focused on enhancing collaboration between organizations and improving volunteer recruitment, onboarding, and resource sharing. A central theme was how to streamline volunteer onboarding processes—particularly the duplication of background checks across organizations—which can be time-consuming and costly for volunteers. Attendees also noted a lack of awareness about available volunteer roles and community resources.

Through group discussions, four key needs emerged: harmonizing legal requirements, improving promotion and outreach, reducing costs for adaptive sports equipment, and creating inclusive volunteer opportunities for individuals with disabilities. Many emphasized the value of making it easier for individuals with impairments to give back through volunteering.

Proposed strategies included creating a central database of volunteer opportunities, increasing outreach to students at Western and Fanshawe, and promoting events via social media and community platforms. Suggestions like “Try-it Days” and a “Travelling Volunteer Expo” were shared as creative ways to help potential volunteers connect with organizations.

Other important issues discussed included a lack of public awareness of existing programs—particularly for older adults with disabilities—and the need for greater visibility of grants, support groups, and services already available in the region. The idea of participating in an upcoming Access Expo at Parkwood Institute (Sept 11) or the “It’s Still Me” event sponsored by Kiwanis Club (Sept 27) was also suggested to introduce the public to local organizations.

Looking ahead, partners recommended developing a centralized contact list to improve coordination across groups, share resources, and ensure more efficient service delivery. ADAPTability is excited to carry these ideas forward and looks forward to continuing to support the vibrant accessibility and adaptive sport community in London.
